

## Pronunciation: /i/, /ı/, & /ai/

The /i/ (as in see /si/) /ı/ (as in it /ıt/), and /ai/ (as in my /mai/) vowels are all sounds that are frequently written with the letter i. They are pronounced differently though. You pronounce the /i/ vowel by keeping the space in your mouth pretty small, your tongue is forward, and you tense your mouth and tongue. The /i/ vowel is very similar, but you relax your mouth and tongue. When you relax, pull your tongue down just a little bit. The /ai/ sound is actually a combination of two vowels /a/ + /i/. The /a/ vowel is made by making the space in your mouth very big and pulling your tongue back. By saying the /a/ and /i/ vowel close together, you get the /ai/ vowel. The paragraph below is to help you practice. The vowels in blue and underlined are the /i/ (as in see /si/) sound, the vowels in green and double underlined are the /ı/ (as in it /it/) sound, and the vowels in red and dotted underlined are the /ai/ (as in my /mai/) sound. Read the paragraph a few times outloud, then record yourself reading it. Send your recording to your teacher and ask for feedback.
